The Union Carbide Nuclear Company has contributed \$8,150 to the 1958 Community Chest-Red Cross for Anderson County, it has been announced by L. H. Barker, Oak Ridge National Laboratory, fund campaign chairman for the three UCNC installations in Oak Ridge.

Y-12ers, who have not previously been contributing through the Central Fund Plan of payroll deductions, have been returned. An overwhelming majority of the cards showed that the signers contributed generously to the Community Chest-Red Cross work.

## Educational Aid Offered Hourly Y-12ers

Assistance Plan Same As For Salaried Roll

Y-12 hourly employees now may participate in the Union Carbide Company Education Assistance Plan. The benefits for the hourly employees under the Plan are the same as those available to salaried employees.

The Educational Assistance Plan provides for payment by the Company of 50 per cent of the cost of tuition, books, laboratory fees and necessary funds for employees taking courses at approved educational institutions that will relate to work being done by the employee in the plant.

To qualify for educational assistance under the Plan, employees must have at least six months of Company Service. On approval of supervision, prospective applicants for benefits may obtain full information from the Training Department, Bldg. 9704-2, plant phone 7751.

Y-12 Plant Superintendent John P. Murray is on a fast-moving and brief business visit to an atomic energy installation in England this week and next — leaving last Thursday morning and being scheduled to return to Oak Ridge Monday, December 1. His destination was the British atomic energy facility at Aldermaston, about 45 miles from London.

On his departure from the Y-12 Plant Thursday morning, he was given "bon voyage" wishes from Assistant Y-12 Plant Superintendent George A. Strasser and Shift Superintendent Dan H. Rader.

His schedule called for departure from the Knoxville airport via American Airlines Thursday afternoon. He was slated to stop over in Washington for a conference with Atomic Energy Commission officials Friday before taking off for London on a Pan American Airlines plane Saturday. His arrival in England was set for Sunday.

After the two-week parleys in England, Superintendent Murray is scheduled to leave London on Sunday, November 30, arriving in New York the following day and

## 13th Disabling Injury Breaks Y-12 Safety String

The latest string of accident-free days in the Y-12 Plant Area was concluded on Thursday, November 13, when the 13th disabling injury of the year was sustained by a Y-12er. The accident was suffered by an outside machinist in the Mechanical Maintenance Department, whose right hand was so badly crushed while he was working on an air compressor that it had to be amputated at Oak Ridge Hospital.

The accident-free period ran for 42 days with 1,313,000 hours of plant operations having been completed without a lost time accident.

## Retired Y-12er Dies At Home In Florida

P. W. G. Nielson, 73, a retired Y-12er who left here on July 1, 1952 after eight years with Carbide, died at his home in Mt. Dora, Fla., November 8. Word of his death was received by Ernie Zurcher, Special Projects, who was Mr. Nielson's department head in the former Research Engineering Department when the former Y-12er retired.

The news on Mr. Nielson's death came in a letter from Mrs. Victoria C. Nielson, widow of the retired Y-12er, to Zurcher. She just said "his heart gave out" after he had been in failing health for several years. He had been bedridden for only two days before his death, Mrs. Nielson said, in asking that his friends be notified—"he loved them very much."

Mr. Nielson came to work in Y-12 on October 22, 1944. He was born in Gothenburg, Sweden, June 25, 1885, and was graduated from the famed university of that city. He came to the United States shortly afterward and held engineering positions with several leading corporations. He was naturalized as an American citizen March 17, 1925, at Greensboro, N. C.

He was well-known and well-liked by hosts of friends in the Y-12 Plant during his stay here. He was a Mason, member of Kerbela Temple of the Shrine, Knoxville, and of the Oak Ridge Shrine Club. All who knew him in Y-12 extend their deepest sympathy to all survivors.

## Bridge, Road At Edgemoor Opening Soon

### Greatly Needed Traffic Artery Near Completion

Here's good news for Y-12ers who travel the Edgemoor Road and bridge route from northern Knox County or southern Anderson County to Oak Ridge.

The new road and bridge from U. S. Highway No. 25 at Claxton School to connect with the Bethel Valley Road in Oak Ridge is practically complete and the State Road Department plans to open the new thoroughfare between December 15 and January 1.

#### Old Route Torturous

The completion of this greatly needed traffic artery into Oak Ridge will be greeted with cheers by all motorists who for the past many years have been travelling the narrow, curvy and bumpy road and the ancient one-way bridge that creaks and squeaks with every passing vehicle.

At the end of last week, J. M. Smart, State Highway Department engineer in charge of the project, pointed out that the new concrete and steel bridge is "99.4 percent complete." The final touches of pouring the concrete handrails and painting the steel underwork is all that remained to be done to complete the span. The road links from Claxton to the bridge, about three miles; and the stretch from the span to connect with the present Bethel Valley Road, around 1.2 miles; have been completed and are ready for traffic.

#### Bridge 400 Feet Long

The handsome new bridge is approximately 1,400 feet long with a 28-foot wide roadway and two-foot safety lane or sidewalk on each side. The bridge is approximately 80 feet above ground level and crosses three channels of the Clinch River. It is about 1,000 yards upstream from the old span.

## Ridge Safety Lane Now Open For Tests

### Early Visits Are Urged For Check Of Vehicles

The Oak Ridge Safety Lane off East Division Road now is open for the usual semi-annual check of motor vehicles and all Y-12 motorists are urged to take advantage of the opportunity to determine if their personal cars or trucks are in safe operating condition. The lane will be open through November 29 and an early visit is urged to avoid the usual last minute rush.

A thorough inspection — but one that requires only a brief time — is given operating parts of motor vehicles. Brakes, lights, horn, windshield wiper, wheel alignment and other such equipment that is vital to the safe operating condition of a car are tested. A prized sticker indicating the car is safe for driving is issued all cars passing the inspection. If some one part is found defective, drivers may have it repaired and the vehicle rechecked for the one deficiency.

The Safety Lane may be reached from East Division Road or from the Oak Ridge Turnpike at the Price Florist firm.



## ASM Will Hear Talk By Naval Researcher

### Monthly Chapter Meet Set Tonight In Ridge

L. S. Birks, Chief of the X-Ray Optics Branch of the Naval Research Laboratory, Washington, D. C., will be guest speaker at the monthly meeting of the Oak Ridge Chapter of the American Society for Metals tonight, Wednesday, November 19. The meeting will be at 8 o'clock in the Knights of Columbus Hall, Jefferson Circle, Oak Ridge.

In his talk, Birks will discuss the metallurgical applications of the electron probe microanalyzer. This tool is designed to measure the chemical composition of areas as small as one micron on a specimen surface or in particulate matter as small as micro-micrograms. This is accomplished by exciting the characteristic X-Ray spectra of the specimens and then analyzing these characteristic X-Rays according to wavelength and intensity.

Birks holds a bachelor's and master's degree in physics and has been actively engaged in X-Ray and electron diffraction, electron microscopy and X-Ray spectroscopy for 16 years. He is a member of the American Physical Society, the American Society for Testing Materials and the Electron Microscopy Society of America.

Y-12 members of the ASM are urged to attend the session and the public is invited.
