Safety In Atomic Operations Will Feature Papers To Be Released At Meeting Of ANS

AEC Chairman McCone Will Be On Program

More than 1,100 nuclear scientists, 60 domestic organizations and three foreign governments will cooperate in the release of about 200 technical papers in discussing the latest technical information on atomic energy at the meeting of the American Nuclear Society at Gatlinburg next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, June 15, 16 and 17. Several Y-12ers will be among a large delegation from Oak Ridge attending the three-day session.

Former Ridgers To Attend

Among the visiting scientists at the Gatlinburg meeting will be many former Oak Ridgers that will give the meeting an "Oak Ridge Alumni" atmosphere.

John A. McCone, chairman of the United States Atomic Energy Commission, will be on the program as one of the principal speakers. Others will include such internationally famous scientist-engineers are Dr. Eugene Wigner, well-known physicist of Princeton, N.J.; Dr. F. K. Pittman, director of the division of reactor development of the AEC; and Dr. Jules Gueron, director general of the research and training department of the European Atomic Energy Commission.

To Cite Work Of ANS

Safety in atomic and nuclear operations will be stressed at the meeting, with the Health Physics Society cooperating with the ANS in presentation of papers. Some of the subjects will include what the ANS is doing to establish standards of safe reactor design, safe reactor locations, safe handling of fissionable materials, safe operating standards and the principles of safety systems. Also to be discussed will be the neutron age as it affects safety and design considerations, fast reactor safety and latest developments in the reprocessing of irradiated fuels.

During the three-day meeting current films on atomic energy developments in the United States, United Kingdom, France and Russia will be shown. Many of these films were shown at the International "Atoms for Peace" meeting in Geneva, Switzerland, last Sep-

tember. Some of the films will be shown in the United States for the first time at the Gatlinburg session.

The Oak Ridge Chapter of the ANS will be host for the meeting. General chairmen for the gathering will be Francois Kertesz and Charles E. Winters, both of the Oak Ridge National National Laboratory.

Yale Scientist To Speak At Physics Seminar Meet

Gregory Breit, of Yale University, New Haven, Conn., will speak at the physics seminar session of the physics division of Oak Ridge National Laboratory on Friday afternoon of this week, June 12. The meeting will be at 3:15 o'clock in the auditorium of Bldg. 4500, ORNL. The discussion subject will be "Nucleon - Nucleon Forces." Y-12ers interested in the topic are invited to attend.

Three Y-12ers Named To Ridge Council

Bissell, Livingston And Francke Elected

Upholding the standards set many years ago, Y-12ers will continue to have an active part in the civic affairs of Oak Ridge when the community becomes an incorporated city. At the election to name members of the first city council for the newest city in Tennessee, three of the eight successful candidates were Y-12ers.

Elected were A. K. Bissell, of the SS Control Department, who polled 446 votes in the Cedar Hill District; T. R. Livingston, General Machine Shop, who received 127 votes in the Robertsville District; and Harry C. Francke, of Development Operations, recipient of 231 votes in the Woodland District.

Bissell is a veteran of the old Town Council of Oak Ridge. He was elected to the council in 1956 and made chairman about nine months later. He participated in the ground breaking ceremonies for the new municipal building in June 1957, and again at the dedication of the new building last June. He has been a Y-12er since July, 1943, and has taken an active part in church and civic affairs as well as youth activities for years.

The other two Y-12 councilmen have had no previous service on the council.

The new council will take office next Tuesday, June 16, when a mayor will be elected. A city manager also is to be chosen.

UCNC Will Operate Mill For AEC In Wyoming

Union Carbide Corporation has signed a contract with the Atomic Energy Commission for operation of a new uranium processing mill in Wyoming. The agreement was made with the Globe Mining Co., a subsidiary of UCC, and covers the construction and operation of the mill in the eastern Gas Hills section of Natrona County, Wyo. The mill will have a capacity of about 492 tons of ore per day, will be financed by UCC and operated through the Union Carbide Nuclear Co. The contract with the AEC runs until December 31, 1966. Construction of the mill will begin immediately.

Y-12 Makes Good Start On 25th Safety Period

1,500,000 Hour Mark Reached; Awards For 24th Selected

Union Carbide Nuclear Company employees in the Y-12 Plant Area are making another strong bid for honors in accident prevention honors as they have again passed the 1,500,000-hour mark of plant operations without a disabling accident. This milestone was reached at midnight last Wednesday night, June 3, when the safety scoreboard showed that 1,504,000 man-hours had been worked with no lost time mishaps. **One Accident This Year**

At that time 47 days had passed without a disabling injury. The last and only lost time accident in the Y-12 Plant this year came on April 16. The current Union Carbide Safety Period is the 25th since 1947 and will become official after a 20-day waiting period to determine if any pending cases develop.

Meanwhile UCNC employees in the Y-12 Plant Area completed their individual safety award choices for the 24th UCC Safety Period and orders for more than 6,000 articles were placed by the Safety Department. The 24th Period was the second longest in the history of the Y-12 Plant with a total of 4,963,757 hours of plant operations without a disabling injury. The period started November 14, 1958 and continued until April 16 of this year.

In the selection of items for individual safety awards the most popular article was the blanket, chosen by 1,147. Tied for second place at 1,108 each were the copper-lined double boiler and the welding torch kit. Then in order came the soldering kit 618, twin spot light 468, set of two air mattresses 452, scissors set 441, travel alarm clock 272, men's umbrella 244, travel iron 183, Zip-A-Robe 161, dozen pair of men's socks 152, Shaffer fountain pen 137, lunch box with thermos bottle 124.



The youngster, a 1955 graduate of Oak Ridge High School where he excelled in several sports, led the ETSC Buccaneers with the bat during the past season and has drawn the attention of several major league scouts who have seen him in action.

Had .382 Batting Average
The former Oak Ridge Wildcat athlete not only had the best hitting average for the Bucs this spring, but also the most time at bats. His mark was 26 base hits out of 68 times at bat for a lofty average of .382. Among these safeties were a number for extra bases, some of which won vital games for the Bucs.


Played With Florida Team





HOW 'PACKING' STARTED

In colonial times when pickled meat was "packed" in barrels for shipment, the commercial slaughtering and processing of livestock became known as "meat packing," says a 20th Century Fund report.
